During the month, most donors contributed rice, vegetable oil, and other essential food items. Our continued encouragement to donate healthy foods has positively influenced donation practices. As a result, the majority of donors now provide nutritious foods such as rice, green leafy vegetable, beaten rice and oil, which has helped reduce the consumption of unhealthy foods among the children.

An important local donor of utensils, rice, and other essential items recently passed away in an accident. we visited his family to express our heartfelt condolences and gratitude for his generous support.



Board Meeting

During the month, several staff and board meetings were held on different dates, particularly during the visit of Mr. Henk Hooghuis, chairman of SSCHN. During his visit, multiple meetings took place between Manager Aashu Kumar Mandal and the Counsellor to discuss various organizational and child welfare matters.

He provided several working formats to guide activities with the children. These tools will help strengthen documentation and support the organization in becoming more professional and systematic in its approach.

An open discussion was held with the Duhabi Board members, including the Chairperson, Treasurer, Secretary, and other members. Chairman of SSCHN asked about the roles and backgrounds of the board members, and some explained that they are social activists committed to the welfare of the children.

There was also detailed discussion with the Treasurer regarding fund mobilization and financial monitoring. It was clarified that the Duhabi Home follows a transparent system, making payments to vendors primarily by cheque, which can be easily verified through bank statements. Cash payments are made only to local vendors when necessary.

The board members also requested training on effective methods for working with and supporting the children.

Reports of Children

During the month, volunteer activities were conducted by Marie Therese. She organized a drawing session in which the children were assigned to draw each other's faces. The children were highly focused and actively participated in the activity under her guidance. They felt happy and encouraged by her visit. During the session, she also provided helpful suggestions and simple drawing techniques to improve their skills.



According to the visit of Marie Therese, the children were highly focused during the session, including those who are usually restless and overactive. After the workshop, their drawings were displayed in the living room. We plan to organize drawing classes on a regular basis to further support the children's creativity and concentration skills. During the month, two new water geysers were installed, making it easier for the children to bathe comfortably during the cold season. The availability of hot water has significantly improved their daily routine.

For the installation, several quotations were obtained from different vendors in Duhabi and nearby areas. The supplier was selected based on a competitive rate that aligned with the budget, as well as product quality, which included a two-year guarantee and a three-year warranty.



The children and staff members participated in a meditation session organized by the State Child Care Federation Union. The children were actively engaged in the session and gained useful tips for practicing regular meditation and exercise at home.



During the reporting period, physical growth and overall health status of the children were monitored and assessed. All children fully participated in the health check process, and growth tracking was completed systematically. The overall health condition of the children was found to be stable.

In addition, the school routine and the leadership roles of the elder children were reviewed. The elder children openly shared their experiences. Some children have a natural talent for organizing activities, and we encourage this by assigning them responsibilities so they can develop their skills in a positive and engaging way.



Training/ Extra Session

No formal training was conducted during the month. However, the children participated in a drawing session, where they actively engaged in creative activities.

Education

The schools published the examination results during the month. All children passed their examinations; however, Shristy failed in one subject. After discussing the matter with her class teacher, it was advised that she requires additional time and support in that subject, while her performance in the other subjects is satisfactory. Similarly, Ram and Laxman also need extra classes to further improve their academic performance.

Hygiene

Cleanliness is consistently maintained in the home to ensure a safe and healthy environment for the children. Toilets, bathrooms, and surrounding areas are cleaned regularly to prevent the spread of germs. The children, particularly the girls, support these efforts, and they are regularly guided on proper hygiene practices, including handwashing after using the toilet and before meals.

Repair and maintenance

During the month, several repair and renovation works were carried out. Repairs were needed for the dining tables and benches, bathroom and toilet doors, and window nets. The shoe racks were repainted, and an additional shoe rack was newly constructed. The children's old cupboards were repaired and painted, improving their appearance and extending their lifespan.

The study room was also renovated; carpets were replaced, old desk benches were substituted with smaller sitting desks, and the room was repainted in a light color to create a brighter and more comfortable learning environment.



The main gate of home was repaired after the door hinge rusted and broke. The gate has now been fixed for safety purposes, but some painting and minor concrete finishing work are still pending.

Medical issues

All the children were observed to be fit and healthy during the month. No child fell ill, as the home mother provided careful and attentive supervision.

Safety Measures

Staff members were present at all times to supervise the children and prevent any injuries during play. The children were instructed to wear slippers regularly for safety and were guided on how to play properly and responsibly.
